- The new bench we ordered for the Chinese section of the Granite Creek Cemetery arrived. Bob Sterne and I put it in place, and it looks really nice. That should be enough benches now.



While we were at the Cemetery we did a walk-about to check on things. A grave from 2007 had pretty lilies planted on it. It looks like those lilies are spreading with the help of birds and now they are popping up in different places throughout the Cemetery. They are lovely!! There are also quite a few asters coming up.





Some of the graves are getting very overgrown. It would be much appreciated if we could have some volunteers do weed whacking where they see fit.

Maurice Chartrand and Tim Wiebe took out the dead trees in Valley View and the area looks much better. Thank you so much Maurice and Tim for your hard work.

- On July 23 Bob and I took a group from the BC Historical Federation on a tour of the Granite Creek Town Site and the Cemetery. It was part of their Annual Conference which was hosted by the Princeton Museum. Thirteen people attended and the tour lasted about two hours. Everyone seemed quite interested and asked many questions. One member is an expert on Chinese graves which were exhumed from old BC cemeteries decades ago. He has promised to write an article for us so that we can include it on our GCPS website.
- **EXCITING DISCOVERY!!!** Greg Nesteroff (who attended the abovementioned tour) emailed me. He managed to find the **real name** of Frenchy (the Chinese prospector and gardener from Granite Creek). This is something that has evaded me, so I am thrilled that the mystery is solved. Greg learned Frenchy's real name was **Wah Sing**. Greg found two obituaries for Frenchy. One from the Vancouver Sun dated March 22, 1913, and the second from the (Kamloops) Inland Sentinel from June 25, 1913. Both articles claim he was over 100 years old; however, the obituary in the Similkameen Star stated he was 71 years old (more believable). The newly discovered articles claim that Frenchy spoke English, French, German, Chinook and Siwash. They both relate quite a fantastic story of Frenchy previously being a pirate and the captain of a private junk. His vessel was sunk by the H.M.S. Terror in Sandu. His crew was captured and taken to Hong Kong where they were hung, but Frenchy managed to escape to shore. The story states that upon his death, \$500 in gold dust

was found at his home.
